- Expertise in Roman Republican history. Other desirable expertise includes Roman Law,
 Roman legal history, and/or Ciceronian studies.
- 3) Reading knowledge of Latin and Ancient Greek, as well as the modern languages in which scholarship in this field is written.
- 4) Adequate ability to write English. However, applications from those for whom English is a second language are welcome.
- 5) Access to library resources suitable for this project.
- 6) Necessary computer capabilities and access, including network connection and willingness to install and use a particular Web browser for work on the project.

To apply, please send your *curriculum vitae* and a letter describing yourself with reference to these qualifications, as attached files to me at micalexa@uic.edu. The letter should describe your experience in Roman Republican history, particularly legal history, including a citation for, and brief description of, any relevant publications of yours, and why you are interested in participating in this project. For fullest consideration, applications should be received by **April 1, 2014**.

As explained in the initial announcement, this project will be funded solely by the participants. Participants will be responsible for any expenses incurred by them in the project, and will not receive remuneration for their work. They will also need to attend at their own expense two meetings, an introductory meeting to establish guidelines and procedures and to learn how to use the computer software and a later meeting to present and critique drafts. These meetings will be held in Europe and/or North America.
